Rationale

Bromley Heath Junior School (BHJS) provides education for all, acknowledging that the society within which we live is enriched by diversity. BHJS strives to ensure that the culture and ethos of the school reflect the diversity of ALL members of the school and wider community; we seek to ensure that everyone is equally valued and treats one another with respect and fairness. Learners and other members of the school community are provided with the opportunity to experience, understand and celebrate diversity.

Bromley Heath Junior School also has a duty to promote community cohesion across four dimensions:

- The school community including all stakeholder groups
- The community within which the school is located Bristol and South Gloucestershire
- The national community
- The global community

Legal duties

- We welcome our duties under the Race Relations 1976 as amended by the Race Relations Amendment Act 2000; the Disability Discrimination Acts 1995 and 2005; and the Sex Discrimination Act 1975 as amended by the Equality Act 2010.
- 2. We welcome our duty under the Education and Inspections Act 2006 to promote community cohesion.
- 3. We recognise that these four sets of duties are essential for achieving well rounded and well informed children, and that they reflect international human rights standards as expressed in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, the UN Convention on the Rights of People with Disabilities, and the Human Rights Act 1998.

<u>Aims</u>

In fulfilling the legal obligations referred to above, we are guided by seven Core principles:

Principle 1: All learners are of equal value

We see all learners and potential learners as of equal value regardless of impairment, ethnicity, colour, creed, nationality, national origin, culture, religious affiliation, national origin, status or their gender.

Principle 2: We recognise and respect diversity

Treating people equally does not necessarily involve treating them all the same. Our policies, procedures and activities must not discriminate, but are differentiated, as appropriate, to take account of differences of life-experience, outlook and background, and in the kinds of barrier

and disadvantage which people may face, in relation to impairment, medical needs, ethnicity, colour, creed, nationality, national origin, culture, religious affiliation, national origin, status or their gender

Principle 3: We foster positive attitudes and relationships, and a shared sense of cohesion and belonging

We intend that our policies, procedures and activities should promote positive attitudes, an absence of harassment, positive interaction, good relations and dialogue between groups and communities different from each other, global citizenship, an absence of prejudice-related bullying and harassment and mutual respect

Principle 4: Staff recruitment, retention and development

Policies and procedures should benefit all employees and potential employees, for example in recruitment and promotion, and in continuing professional development.

Principle 5: We aim to reduce and remove inequalities and barriers that already exist

In addition to avoiding or minimising possible negative impacts, we take opportunities to maximise positive impacts by reducing and removing inequalities and barriers that may already exist.

Principle 6: We consult widely

People affected by a policy or activity should be consulted and involved in the design of new policies, and in the review of existing ones.

Principle 7: Society as a whole should benefit

We intend that our policies and activities should benefit society as a whole, both locally and nationally, by fostering greater social cohesion, and greater participation in public life.

Objectives

We will put our core principles into practice by:

- promoting equality and diversity
- challenging and eradicating discrimination; acting quickly to deal with all bullying

- giving a high profile to rights and responsibilities by promoting human rights, justice and fairness throughout the curriculum and wider school community
- promoting community cohesion, for example, through involvement with local partnerships
- opposing all forms of prejudice which stand in the way of fulfilling our legal duties:
 - prejudices around disability and special educational needs
 - prejudices around racism and xenophobia, including those that are directed towards religious groups and communities, for example antisemitism and Islamophobia, and those that are directed against Travellers, refugees and people seeking asylum
 - prejudices reflecting sexism and homophobia

Procedures

We will draw up an action plan (based on our strategic action plan) within the framework of the overall School Development Plan.

We keep each curriculum area and all aspects of learning under review in order to ensure that teaching and learning reflect the seven principles.

We use quantitative and qualitative data relating to the implementation of this policy, and take action as appropriate. In particular we collect, analyse and use data in relation to achievement, broken down as appropriate according to disabilities and special educational needs, ethnicity and gender.

Prejudice-related incidents will be identified as such when anyone involved with the incident feels that it is motivated by prejudice. All such incidents are referred to the Headteacher, whose role it is to assess, record and deal with all incidents. We take seriously our obligation to report regularly to the Local Authority about the numbers, types and seriousness of prejudice-related incidents at our school and how they are dealt with.

We respect the religious beliefs and practice of all staff, pupils and parents, and comply with reasonable requests relating to religious observance and practice.

We ensure that the content of this policy is known to all staff and governors and, as appropriate, to all stakeholders. All staff and governors have access to a selection of resources which discuss and explain concepts of equality, diversity and community cohesion in appropriate detail.

We ensure that all staff, including support and administrative staff, receive appropriate training and opportunities for professional development, both as individuals and as groups of teams.

We ensure that the core principles listed above comply also with the full range of our policies and practices.

Roles and responsibilities

The governing body is responsible for ensuring that the school complies with legislation, and that this policy and its related procedures and strategies are implemented.

A link member of the governing body is appointed to maintain a watching brief regarding the implementation of this policy and will undertake appropriate training in order to lead the Governing Body in fulfilling its role.

The Headteacher is responsible for implementing the policy; for ensuring that all staff are aware of their responsibilities and are given appropriate training and support; and for taking appropriate action in any cases of unlawful discrimination.

All staff are expected to:

- o promote an inclusive and collaborative ethos in their classroom
- o deal with any prejudice-related incidents that may occur
- o identify and challenge bias and stereotyping in the curriculum
- o support pupils in their class for whom English is an additional language
- o keep up-to-date with equalities legislation relevant to their work.
